ISU LEADERSHIP SYMPOSIUM: AN INTERDISCIPLINARY PERSPECTIVE

This year's Leadership Symposium brings Dr. Andrew J. DuBrin, from the Rochester Institute's College of Business in New York, to present valuable concepts about connecting effective leadership perspectives across the disciplines.

The ISU Leadership Program invites students, faculty and staff to register and participate in this event at no cost. The Leadership Symposium is offered in a condensed version on Thursday afternoon, October 20th at the Bennion Student Union Building in Idaho Falls. The full presentation titled *Leadership - An Interdisciplinary Perspective* will take place on Friday, October 21st at the Pond Student Union Building in Pocatello. Breakfast and lunch are included for Friday's registered participants.

Dr. DuBrin will cover 17 leadership components including:

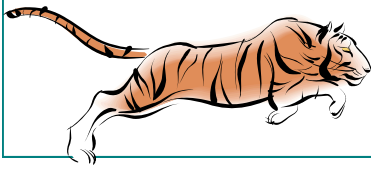
