Program Benefits

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Student Admission, Registration, and Withdrawal Process

Student Eligibility

In order to enroll in the Early College Program, high school students must have a minimum unweighted 2.7 cumulative GPA and be at least 16 years of age or have completed half of their high school requirements. Consent from a parent/guardian is also required for students under 18. Students who do not meet the age or GPA requirement may enroll if recommended by a high school official.

Admission & Registration Process

Students dual credit registration is processed through Dual Enroll. Students will go to isu.dualenroll.com to register. If they already have a Dual Enroll account, they will login in. They may already have an account if they had taken a dual credit class from ISU or another Idaho college/university that uses Dual Enroll (CWI, BSU, CSI, U of I, CEI). If a student does not have an account, they will need to create one. Students should only have **ONE** Dual Enroll account! Please see the scenarios listed below and the steps the student needs to take. *If a student is not sure if they have an existing account, they can check with their high school counselor or CCA.*

If student does not have a Dual Enroll account, start here:

1. Create a Dual Enroll Account

1. Go to isu.dualenroll.com and click on **CREATE MY ACCOUNT**.
2. Provide all information including a login name and password. All fields marked with a red asterisk (*) are required. You must provide either an email or cell phone number to create the account. If a cell phone is used, standard text message rates apply.
3. Once you click **Create Account**, you'll receive either a text message with an activation code or an email with a link to confirm your account. You must confirm your account before you can proceed with the application and registration. If using email, be sure to check your junk and spam folders for the email.

If student has a Dual Enroll account but has never taken an ISU class, start here:

4. Once successfully logged in, student will complete the application information in Dual Enroll. As they progress through the application the current step will be highlighted orange under the application steps and will turn green once completed. All required fields are marked with an asterisk. Make sure to click the update button to move to the next step. Note: Parent contact information cannot be the same as the student contact information.

Once the application has been completed, the Consent Form will be sent to the parent/guardian via text and/or email. If parent/guardian does not receive the notification, it can be resent from the registration status page. Parent contact information can also be updated from You the student's profile page.

If student has a Dual Enroll account and has previously taken an ISU class, start here:

2. Register for Classes

5. Click on the Courses tab to review the list of available courses. The course finder shows which ISU courses are being offered at your school. Use any of the filtering options on the left to narrow down your search. Click on the course name to see the detailed class description and available sections.
6. When you've made your decision on a course and section, click the **REGISTER** button to start the registration process. If the course you are registering for has a prerequisite that you have not met, Dual Enroll will email you to let you know the steps needed to complete the prerequisite before the registration deadline.
7. You may choose to: Select another course, view registration status, or logout.
8. You will receive an email and/or text from ISU letting you know when your registration is complete or if we need more information from you.

3. Request Advanced Opportunities Funding

9. Talk to your high school counselor/CCA or visit <https://advancedops.sde.idaho.gov>

To be fully registered in a dual credit class, students must complete all steps listed above, including requesting Advanced Opportunities Funding (if applicable). Dual Enroll will send students an email to confirm that they've been successfully registered for a course. Students can also ask their teachers or call the ECP office at (208)282-6067 if they are unsure if they have successfully registered.

Placement Scores

Early College Program students who wish to take a college-level Biology, Chemistry, Math, or Physics course need to have completed a prerequisite in order to register for the course. Placement can be satisfied with either the prerequisite course or an ACT, SAT, ISAT, or ALEKS (Math) test score, as shown below. Passing placement scores need to be submitted to the Early College Program Office prior to registering for the course.

**The Write Class is no longer an ENGL requirement for Early College Program students. However, students must complete ENGL 1101 before registering for ENGL 1102.*

Student Drop & Withdrawal Process

Dropped course(s) do not appear on your transcript, and tuition charges are subtracted from your account and are refundable, if completed before the add/drop deadline. It is as if you never registered from the course. The add/drop deadline for each course can be found under Important Dates (Appendix A) or on the [Early College Program website](#). To drop a course, the student will need to pull up the course in Dual Enroll and select “Drop.” If this option does not appear, it may be past the deadline. If it is still within the deadline timeframe and is not appearing, please contact the Early College Program at (208)282-6067. If you drop a course that you have already requested Advanced Opportunities funding, please work with your School Counselor/CCA to adjust the funding request.

Withdraw indicates the student attempted the course but did not complete it (and did not drop before the add/drop deadline). Students can, for medical, academic, or personal reasons, choose to withdraw from an Early College Program course before the withdrawal deadline. When a student withdraws from a class, a “W” will be placed on their transcript. This will not count toward their GPA. However, there is no tuition refund for withdrawn courses and doing so will affect Fast Forward funding. Students also need to be aware that withdrawing from too many courses can affect their Academic Standing and future Financial Aid. To withdraw from a course, the student will need to pull up the course in Dual Enroll and select “Withdraw.” If this option does not appear, it may be past the withdrawal deadline. please contact the Early College Program office at (208)282-6067.

Students who need to withdraw after the withdrawal deadline will need to contact the Early College Program Office to request a late withdrawal petition. See our Important Dates (Appendix A) for the withdraw deadline for each term.

Taking a Course Online or on an Idaho State University Campus

Early College students can also take on-campus/online courses taught by Idaho State University professors for a discounted rate of \$75 per credit. In order to register for an on-campus course, they will need to be admitted to the Early College Program, meet any course pre-requisites, and meet with an Early College Program advisor. On-campus courses are subject to on-campus registration and payment deadlines and may have additional fees. You may also be required to purchase textbooks and have a campus parking permit. Student Responsibilities

- Discuss enrollment options with parent, ECP Staff, and/or high school counselor
- Take ACT/SAT/ ALEKS placement tests if needed
- Apply and register online through [DualEnroll](#)
- Apply for Fast Forward/Advanced Opportunities funding
- Pay fees for dual credit courses not covered by Fast Forward through [MyISU](#) by appropriate deadline
- Purchase textbooks and materials, if required.
- Contact ISU if accommodations are needed - contact ISU Disability Services at 208-282-3599 - for assistance
- Check ISU email regularly for announcements
- Study - It is recommended that you study 2-3 hours a week outside of class for every 1 credit hour registered
- Drop or withdraw from a dual credit course by the deadline if you:
 - a. decide not to take the course for college credit
 - b. transferred out of the high school class
 - c. transferred to another high school

Note: Refunds are **NOT** given for withdrawals. Students who do not withdraw and/or fail to complete the course will likely receive a failing grade for the class, which will become part of their permanent college academic record. Withdrawal deadlines are strictly enforced.

It is important to remember that as an Early College student, you are also an Idaho State University student, and you will be held to the academic policies of the university, including academic integrity and dishonesty policies. ISU college credits and grades earned will be recorded on permanent college transcripts.

Academic Integrity and Dishonesty Policy

Academic integrity is expected of all Early College students. Behavior beyond reproach must be the norm. Academic dishonesty in any form is unacceptable. Plagiarism (taking ideas or words from others without proper credit) and cheating (submitting work that is created by someone/something other than you) is not allowed. FERPA

Idaho State University and the Early College Program, in compliance with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), is responsible for protecting and maintaining the privacy of student records and judiciously evaluating requests for release of information from those records. FERPA affords students certain rights with respect to their education records.

When a student enters a higher education institute, regardless of age, their FERPA rights are transferred to them. This means that parents **DO NOT** have access to a student's academic records through ISU.

MyISU

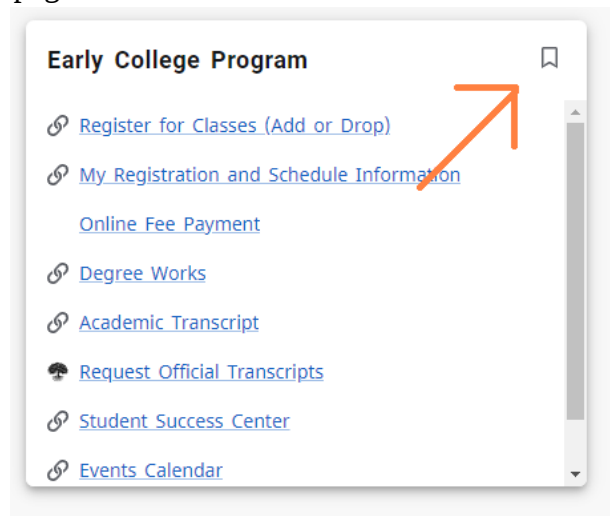
MyISU is Idaho State University's web portal that allows students to view their personal information via the internet, check class schedules, see final grades, pay for classes, access university library, and more. You need a username and password to access MyISU which can be obtained from the IT Service Desk at 208-282-4357. You will receive your information via email after you have been admitted to the Early College Program. See the steps below for claiming your account. Claiming Your Account

1. You will receive an email from iam@isu.edu (if not in inbox check spam). If you cannot find this email, please contact us, and we can resend it.
2. Open the email and follow the instructions: copy the Account Claim String and click on the Claim Link
3. Enter your user information: email that you receive the account claim, DOB, Captcha, and submit
4. Review and Accept Terms of Use
5. The Screen will display your username, click next to set up security questions
6. Create and confirm password

Adding the Early College Program Card

Once you have successfully claimed your account and logged into MyISU, you will need to add the Early College Program card to your homepage. To do this, you will click the three lines in the top lefthand corner and click "Discover." You will then search for "Early College Program." By clicking the bookmark, you will add the card to your homepage.



Now that you have added the Early College Program card to your homepage, you will have access to many of the resources that are available to Early College students, including accessing your registration information, online fee payment, requesting a transcript, the Student Success Center webpage, the Events Calendar, and more.

Google Apps/Webmail

Your Google Apps at ISU account includes Gmail, Google Calendar, Google Docs, and other powerful Google features. You get 10 GB of storage space and an ISU email address. You can log into your email account through MyISU or by going directly to webmail.isu.edu and entering your email, which is your username@isu.edu and your ISU password. If you already have another email account you would like to

keep using, set up forwarding so that you will receive your important ISU messages. Go to tigertracks.isu.edu/TDClient/1950/Portal/KB/ArticleDet?ID=57257 to find out how.

Please plan on checking your ISU email daily. All messages from Financial Aid and Scholarships (when you apply as an undergraduate student) will be sent to your ISU email. Your ISU professors will also contact you using this email address.

Grades

Instructors will grade students with the standard grading +/- scale A, B, C, D, and F (The grades of A+, F+, and F- are not used). Students can also receive an “X” grade if they did not attend their course. Students also have the option to

receive an Incomplete “I” grade for a course (see additional information below).

When a student is given an “I” grade, they have one calendar year to complete course work, given they are still enrolled in high school. If an “I” is given to a senior, they need to complete the course work before graduation. If not completed, the “I” grade will default to an “F” grade. The instructor and student must complete a “course completion contract” which can be found at <https://www.isu.edu/media/libraries/early-college/CourseCompletionContract-October-2019.pdf>. Once the course work is completed the teacher will need to submit a change of grade form to the Early College Program Office.

Student Benefits

Cost

Courses taught in the high school are **\$75.00/credit**. Early College Program students can also take courses online or on the Pocatello, Idaho Falls, or Meridian campuses for \$75.00/credit. That’s over \$360/credit cheaper than the undergraduate part-time tuition rate. Most students do not have any out-of-pocket expenses for tuition as they are able to utilize their Advanced Opportunities/Fast Forward funding.

Advanced Opportunities

Advanced Opportunities provides \$4,625 for students in grades 7-12 attending a public school in Idaho. Funds can be used for overload courses, **dual credits courses**, workforce training, and college-bearing exams. Students need to request funding for each ISU course that they take before the deadline (See Appendix A). Some schools have the school counselor or CCA request funding on the student’s behalf. Bengal ID Card



A Bengal ID Card is a student's ISU identification card and is used to gain access to student benefits. Bengal Cards are free for registered students and can be obtained at the Student Union Campus Connections desk in Pocatello and Idaho Falls or at the Health Science Center in Meridian. To get a card, you will need to bring a photo ID (such as a Driver's License or School ID) and be currently registered for an Early College Program course. If you are not able to come to campus to get your Bengal Card (and have never received a Bengal ID Card), you can request to have the Bengal ID mailed to you by doing the following:

- Upload your Bengal ID photo using the [Bengal ID online request form](https://isu.edu/campusconnection/get-your-bengal-id/) (isu.edu/campusconnection/get-your-bengal-id/). The website explains the guidelines for an acceptable ID photo and provides a link to upload a photo and to provide your name and Bengal number. (Note: The photo needs to be just you with a solid background).
- When you fill out the form, you will choose the campus option for Online/Pocatello/Idaho Falls. You will receive an email from infodesk@isu.edu to confirm whether or not your photo has been approved.
- When you receive an email that your photo has been approved, you need to reply that you are an Early College Program (ECP) student and provide your mailing address. Your Bengal ID will be mailed from the Pocatello campus within the next 24 hours (longer on weekends). It may take up to 5 business days to receive your ID, depending on your location in Idaho.

Bengal Cards are used for campus activities including usage of Reed Gym, checking out books at the library, or tutoring services through the Student Success Center, including the Math Lab and Writing Center. They can also be used for entry into various campus events

Reed Gym

Early College Program students have the opportunity to use Reed Gym for \$60.00 per ISU semester. All users must be registered for at least one Early College Program course, be at least 16 years of age, and have signed permission from a parent, per Campus Recreation Policy, before being able to use the gym. Memberships are on a per ISU semester basis and can be purchased at the Campus Recreation Office in Reed Gym. For more information, please call 208-282-4854.

Student Success Center - Tutoring

Students enrolled in Early College Program courses have access to the Idaho State University Student Success Center. Students can receive free tutoring in writing, math, and course specific topics. Please visit their website for additional information at isu.edu/success.

ADA/Disability Services

Idaho State University is committed to providing equal access and opportunities in education for all students. Early College Program students may be eligible for accommodations through Idaho State University's Disability Services office. Advising and Degree Maps

A Degree Map is a semester-by-semester list of courses which a student needs to take in order to obtain a particular degree. A Degree Map suggests courses to complete each semester in order to be "on track" to graduate by taking the right courses in the right order. If you know what you might be interested in studying

once you get to college, you can meet with an Early College Transition Advisor, who will walk you through the Degree Map for any program offered at Idaho State University. If you are undecided, an Early College Transition Advisor can also help you explore programs that ISU offers to figure out what would be a good fit for you, as well as offer academic advising for [General Education Objectives](#) (Appendix C). Once you know what classes you'll need to take for a specific degree, you can begin taking some of those courses as an Early College Program student.

Students Attending Idaho State University after Graduation (Degree Seeking)

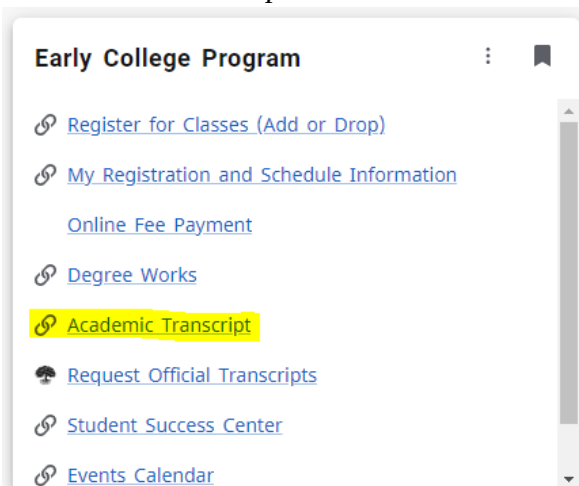
Students planning to attend Idaho State University after high school graduation will need to fill out an Undergraduate Application (degree-seeking). **Students are not automatically admitted to ISU after being an Early College student, and will have to complete a separate application.** They will need to apply using either “Apply Idaho” or ISU’s internal online application. This online application can be found at isu.edu/apply/undergraduate/. Students will need to submit a high school transcript or GED at the time of application, a FINAL high school transcript is required after high school graduation. The \$50 application fee is waived for graduates of an Idaho high schools. SAT and ACT scores are **not** required for admission, but are encouraged for course placement. In order to be considered for scholarships, applications need to be submitted by the July 1 deadline. Students will be notified via email of admission status.

Transcripts

All Early College Program credits and grades are listed on an official Idaho State University transcript. **Official** transcripts from Idaho State University and other institutions can be ordered through the [National Student Clearinghouse](#) and cost \$16.00 per copy (subject to change) plus any delivery method service charge. Students must send final official transcripts from **all** intuitions in which they took dual credit courses, to the intuition they choose to attend after graduation. Failure to do so may result in academic dishonesty. For additional information, visit transcripts.isu.edu. See Appendix J for more detailed instructions.

Students also have access to view their **unofficial** ISU transcript for advising purposes. There is no charge to view or print an unofficial transcript. To access their unofficial transcript, login to [MyISU](#), find the Early College Program card, and click *Academic Transcript*.



Set your Transcript Level to “All Levels” and your Transcript Type to “Advising Transcript.” At this point, you can view and print your unofficial ISU transcript.

To learn how to view unofficial transcripts from other Idaho institutions, please see **Appendix E**.

Transferring Credits

Students should check with the Registrar's Office at the university or college they are choosing to attend after high school, if not Idaho State University, in order to see what their transfer policy is, before registering for dual credit courses. The majority of accredited institutions, statewide and nationally, will accept dual credits from Idaho State University toward degree requirements or electives and vice versa. If you decide to attend Idaho State University after you graduate from high school, all the credits you have taken from ISU while in our Early College Program will already be on your transcript.

To transfer credits among institutions, send your official transcripts using the [National Student Clearinghouse](#). Sending an official transcript costs \$16.00 per copy (subject to change) plus any delivery method service charge. You must send all transcripts to the institution in which you chose to enroll. Failure to do so may result in academic dishonesty. For additional information, visit transcripts.isu.edu.

Planning on transferring credits from other institutions to Idaho State? You may consult the [TES Transfer Evaluation System](#) and the [Idaho State Board of Education Transfer Portal](#) websites to see how past coursework has been transferred to ISU. However, please keep in mind that those can serve as guidelines only. Final transfer of credits is contingent on the receipt of an official transcript of records. For most accurate transfer information, please contact the Registrar's Office at tceinfo@isu.edu or (208) 282-2661.

If you would like help looking at transferability among Idaho higher education institutions, please reach out to an Early College Transition Advisor.

Students can also receive credits at ISU based on their AP Exam scores. Please note that you must have the score officially sent to ISU in order to receive credit. See **Appendix J** for instructions on how to send AP Scores. Below is a list of common AP Exams and credit given at Idaho State University based on scores.

On-Campus and Online Courses

The On-Campus Dual Enrollment program has been created in conjunction with campus departments to set aside a certain number of seats per approved course for Early College Program students. This program has allowed students to come on the campus of Idaho State University and take courses for **\$75 per credit**. Courses are available on both the Pocatello and Idaho Falls campus, as well as fully online and via Zoom.

Students need to meet all course prerequisites and may be subject to course fees, textbooks, and parking fees. Students must also complete a mandatory orientation. Students are limited to 7 credits of general education objective courses a semester, unless given specific permission otherwise. Student must register for courses via isu.dualenroll.com. If it is their first time to take courses through ISU, they must create an account and fill out the application at least two-weeks prior to the start of the course.

In order to take an on-campus course during the summer, you **MUST** have taken a prior ISU class on-campus. An on-campus course includes physically on-campus, zoom into lecture and turning assignments in online, or fully online with an ISU professor. If students have not previously taken an on-campus course during a Fall or Spring ISU semester, they will need to get permission from their school counselor.

Benefits of taking an on-campus/online course

- Courses count for both high school and college general education credits
- Idaho's Advanced Opportunities money can be used for on-campus dual enrollment courses

- Variety of courses to choose from
- Allows students to get a head start on college credits
- Get to interact with ISU faculty, staff, and students on a regular basis
- Access to ISU library
- Free tutoring from Student Success Center
- Access to on-campus activities
- Access to Reed Gym for \$60 per ISU Semester

Registering for On-Campus/Online Courses

Students will complete their registration using Dual Enroll (See Appendix B). Students need to pay close attention to the days, times, and locations listed on Dual Enroll when registering for a course. For a complete list of courses being offered, please visit <https://www.isu.edu/ecp/registration/on-campus-dual-enrollment/>.

If a student would like to take a specific class that does not have an Early College Section (E-Section), they may request for a seat to be opened. The course must have seats available and students must meet any course prerequisites prior to requesting a seat. Please note that we cannot guarantee that a seat will be created for you upon filling out the course request form. If a seat is opened, you will be contacted via email and/or text, and the seat will be first-come, first-serve, so you'll need to register ASAP.

On-Campus/Online Orientation

Students who register for on-campus or online courses must complete a **mandatory** orientation before their courses begin. Because you are new to taking our on-campus classes, we want to share all of the resources that are available and show you some important information relating to your class(es).

Orientation is held before the start of each Fall and Spring semester, and there is usually both an in-person and online option. Orientation information will be sent to you via email and/or text after you register and must be completed prior to the semester starting. If you do not complete Orientation before the specified deadline, you will be removed from your ISU course(s).

Accessing your Course

Students will access their ISU coursework via Canvas. To learn more about Canvas, watched the Student Canvas Orientation video created by ISU's ITRC: <https://youtu.be/ekHKrLLmBAQ?si=laCJ3nyvIp86Tj4Y>.

Textbooks for Online/On-Campus Courses: The Book Bundle

The ISU Book Bundle is Idaho State University's course material delivery program that provides access to your required textbooks and other course materials in a convenient package before the first day of class. Students are automatically opted into this program, and costs for all your required course materials are added to your student account at the rate of \$24.75/credit hour. For some, this could be a savings of 35-60%, but for others, choosing to opt out may be more appropriate. It is important to compare costs and make the best selection for you.

How It Works:

- You register for classes
- Compare course materials costs at the ISU Bookstore website (See below) and other sources online.

- One month before classes start, you will receive an email instructing you to review your courses and choose how to receive your materials (NOTE: this will be sent to your ISU Email.)
- The bookstore will prepare your course materials in a convenient package
- You will receive an email notification when your order is ready for pickup at the bookstore or when it ships, depending on your selection
- Digital materials will be delivered within Canvas
- When your courses are over, the bookstore will send you helpful reminder emails to return your rental course materials
- You can opt out if you compare prices and determine the ISU Book Bundle will not be a cost savings for you.

Below are the steps to find your required textbooks in order to compare prices:

1. Go to <https://isu.bncollege.com/>
2. Find the dropdown box that says "Course Materials & Textbooks." Hover over it and select "Find Course Materials."
3. Choose your campus - Pocatello or Idaho Falls
4. Choose "*Term* OPT OUT" as your term
5. Put in your course information - Department, Course #, & Section #
6. Click "Retrieve Materials"

This will bring up all required textbooks for the classes you selected, as well as various format options. This can be used for comparing prices with the Book Bundle. You can copy/paste the ISBN into other websites (i.e. Amazon, Chegg, etc.) for price comparison. This is also how you will purchase books through directly ISU's Bookstore, separate from the Book Bundle.

Students who do not wish to participate in the Book Bundle **MUST** opt out. If you do not opt out, you will still be charged the Book Bundle price, even if you obtain your books from somewhere else. **To learn how to opt out of the Book Bundle, please see Appendix J.**

Sign up for ISU Alerts

Why sign up for ISU Alerts? The ISU Alerts system is used to notify students, faculty and staff of unforeseen events and emergencies on campus, such as severe weather, campus closures, evacuations, critical situations, serious crimes, etc. The system will be activated when there are immediate threats to the health or safety of those in the university community. Notifications will be sent via landline phones, cell phones, text messages, and email.

For students, faculty, and staff to sign up for ISU Alerts:

ECP Student On-Campus Parking

If you are taking an on-campus course, you may be required to obtain a parking pass in order to park in a university parking lot. You can obtain a parking pass at ISU Public Safety/Parking Services in Pocatello at 625 East Humboldt Bldg. 27 or in Idaho Falls at University Place, 1784 Science Center Dr. You can buy a parking pass for the very low cost of \$5 for the school year to park in the **general student parking lots**. Simply tell them you are an Early College student for the discounted price. Please do not park in Reserved parking lots—you will be ticketed.

Encountering Mature Content in Your Course

When taking a college-level course, it is possible that you may be exposed to mature content. Depending on the course, there is a possibility of encountering things such as naked pictures, R-rated movies, difficult topics, and other content that may go against your values. This content may appear in class discussions, assigned reading, lecture material, or elsewhere in the course.

It is your responsibility to do the following **before the add/drop deadline**:

- Look through the course syllabus, focusing particularly on what subject material will be covered
- Be aware of the content present in required textbooks (look through chapter names, headings, etc.)
- Bring up any concerns you might have with the instructor of the course

Please note that instructors are **not** expected to change the content of their course. While some may be willing to provide alternative assignments if there is a concern, they are under no obligation to do so.

Should you decide that you are not comfortable with the content of the course, it is your responsibility to drop the course before the add/drop deadline.

General Education and Elective Courses

Many of the courses that you will take as an Early College student, either in your high school or on-campus/online, will be General Education courses. The General Education program at Idaho State University prepares students to be life-long, independent learners and active, culturally aware participants in diverse local, national, and global communities. As the foundation for all further studies, General Education promotes comprehensive literacy - including effective communication, mathematical, and technological skills; reasoning and creativity; and information literacy - and a broad knowledge base in the liberal arts.

Through completing the General Education program, students will be able to:

- Communicate effectively and clearly in standard written and spoken language;
- Use mathematical language and quantitative reasoning effectively;
- Think logically, critically, and creatively; and
- Locate relevant sources and use them critically and responsibly.

Some ISU General Education courses are common to all majors, such as English Composition and Oral Communication, while other majors have specific requirements for courses that fulfill both general education requirements and a specific degree plan. Students, whenever possible, should take courses that count towards fulfillment of both their general education requirement and a program of study. This is why it is essential to meet with an advisor when picking out your classes. We recommend a meeting with either a College and Career Advisor/Counselor at your high school or an Early College Transition Advisor. Please see Appendix C for ISU's General Education list for the 2024-25 Catalog Year.

GEM-Stamped Courses

GEM (General Education Matriculation) courses are universally accepted across all state institutions in Idaho. Each institution requires a certain number of credits to be earned in each category. The State of Idaho requires Objectives 1-6, and then each college has their own institution-specific objectives. At ISU, the institution-specific objectives are Objectives 7-9. If a course is GEM-Stamped, all institutions in the state of Idaho are required to accept it to fulfill a General Education objective. Please check in with an Early

College Transition Advisor prior to registering for a course to see if it is GEM-Stamped and how it will fit into your generals. Additionally, please see Appendix C for ISU's General Education list for the 2024-25 Catalog Year.

Elective Courses

Degree plans for some majors include a limited number of elective credits. At ISU, a minimum of 60 credit hours are necessary for an Associate's Degree and a minimum of 120 credit hours are necessary for a Bachelor's Degree. 37 of those credits will come from General Education, and each academic program will have a different number of credits that are required. However, many credits remain is the number of electives that you will need to graduate. You can take any course as an elective.

Associate's Degree: 37 GE Credits + X Major Credits + Y Elective Credits = 60 Total Credits

Bachelor's Degree: 37 GE Credits + X Major Credits + Y Elective Credits = 120 Total Credits

Associate's Degree in University Studies

Early College Program students who meet the degree credit requirements and have a cumulative undergraduate GPA of 2.0 or higher are eligible to graduate from Idaho State University with an Associate of Arts in University Studies at the same time that they graduate from high school.

Requirements for an Associate of Arts in University Studies

- **60 Total Credits**

- 37 General Education Credit Requirements
- 15 Major Credit Requirements
 - 6 credits from the College of Arts & Letters
 - 9 credits from CAL, COE, COB, COSE, or KDHS
- Up to 8 Elective Credits
 - As needed to achieve 60 total credit hours

- **15 Resident Credits:** Classes Originating from ISU

- **Cumulative GPA of 2.0:** Must maintain C average

- **Submit a Graduation Application:** Due mid-March of your Senior year

- **Submit Official Transcripts from other colleges to Registrar's Office:** After HS graduation

Students should work closely with both their high school counselor and Early College Program staff to make sure all requirements are fulfilled. Please see Appendix C for a list of ISU General Education Requirements that students can chose from to meet this portion of their degree requirements.

Steps to Becoming an AA Degree-Seeking Student

1. Fill out our Intent to Pursue Associate's Degree Form

- a. This lets us know that you are interested in obtaining an AA while you are in high school. We will reach out to you within a week to schedule an initial meeting.
- b. You can find the Intent Form at isu.edu/ecp/associate-degree/.

2. Schedule a meeting with an Early College Transition Advisor

- a. At this meeting, we will go over all degree requirements, answer any questions you might have, and talk about next steps.
- 3. Take the Focus2Career Assessments provided by ISU's Career Center**
 - a. Because completing an AA speeds you through General Education courses and college exploration time, we want you to know what you'd like to do after completing your AA. You'll be going straight into your program when you start college.
 - b. You'll create an account at isu.edu/career/focus2/ using the access code “bengals”. We then ask that you take the 5 self-assessments: Work Interest, Values, Personality, Skills, and Leisure.
- 4. Have a parent/guardian attend an Associate's Degree Parent Meeting**
 - a. We offer these meetings twice a year—once in November and once in March. If your parent/guardian cannot attend, you can also schedule a one-on-one meeting to go over all the information.
- 5. Have first official Degree Audit meeting with your advisor**
 - a. Start plugging in the classes you've taken and track your progress towards the degree!

Homeschool Student Information

Student Eligibility

Homeschool students who are at least 16-years old and have not yet completed all of their high school requirements can take courses on an ISU campus and qualify for the ECP on-campus rate (\$75/credit). Homeschool students can apply and register for courses following the traditional Registration Process (Appendix B).

In order to participate in Idaho State University's Early College Program, homeschool students will need to complete a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Form. To complete this form, please contact our office at ecp@isu.edu or (208)282-6067.

Advanced Opportunities

Advanced Opportunities funding is available only to students currently attending an Idaho public school. In many cases, homeschool/private school students choose to dually enroll and participate in public school activities as well as homeschool/private school coursework. Many homeschool/private school families have chosen to mix and match the course pathway for their student to include at least one such course, making these funds accessible. Admission & Registration Process

If you have previously taken a Dual Enrollment class through another institution that uses Dual Enroll (CWI, BSU, CSI, U of I, CEI), you will already have a Dual Enroll account set up. You will need to use Idaho State University's login page: isu.dualenroll.com. Once you are on ISU's page, you can use the same username and password that you have previously used for Dual Enroll. *Please do not create another account. If you don't know if you have an existing account, please ask your high school counselor or CCA.*

If you do not have a Dual Enroll account, start here:

1. Create a Dual Enroll Account

1. Go to isu.dualenroll.com and click on **CREATE MY ACCOUNT**.
2. Provide all information including a login name and password. All fields marked with a red asterisk (*) are required. You must provide either an email or cell phone number to create the account. If a cell phone is used, standard text message rates apply.
3. Once you click **Create Account**, you'll receive either a text message with an activation code or an email with a link to confirm your account. You must confirm your account before you can proceed with the application and registration. If using email, be sure to check your junk and spam folders for the email.

If you have a Dual Enroll account but have never taken an ISU class, start here:

4. Once successfully logged in, Dual Enroll will have you complete an application. Once a step is completed, it will be highlighted green under the Application Steps and the current step will show in orange. Required fields are marked with an asterisk. Make sure to click the update button to move to the next step. Note: Parent contact information cannot be the same as the student contact information.

Once the application has been completed, the Consent Form will be sent to your parent/guardian via text and/or email. Please tell your parent to sign it to complete your application. If your parent/guardian does not receive the notification, visit your registration status page to resend. You may also visit your profile page to change your parent's contact information.

If you have a Dual Enroll account and have previously taken an ISU class, start here:

2. Register for Classes

5. Click on the Courses tab to review the list of available courses. The course finder shows which ISU courses are being offered at your school. Use any of the filtering options on the left to narrow down your search. Click on the course name to see the detailed class description and available sections.
6. When you've made your decision on a course and section, click the **REGISTER** button to start the registration process. If the course you are registering for has a prerequisite that you have not met, Dual Enroll will email you to let you know the steps needed to complete the prerequisite before the registration deadline.
7. You may choose to: Select another course, view registration status, or log out.
8. You will receive an email and/or text from ISU letting you know when your registration is complete or if we need more information from you.

Sending Official Transcripts and AP Exam Scores to ISU

Sending Official Transcripts

You will need to send an official transcript from each institution that you have taken college classes from (other than ISU). You will do this using the National Student Clearinghouse's Transcript Ordering Center: tsorder.studentclearinghouse.org/school/select. You'll need either your Student ID number from the school you're requesting from or your Social Security number. Please make sure you have one of these before beginning the process. The NSC website walks you through each step, but please reach out should you run into issues or have questions.

Please make sure that all grades have been finalized and posted to your transcript before having it sent to ISU. You can check this by viewing your unofficial transcript. Or, when filling out the official transcript request form, you can select an option to wait until **after grades are posted** to have the transcript sent.

You'll need to submit a separate request for each school that you are requesting transcripts from. Please note that there is a fee associated with each transcript request. This varies by school, but it is usually between \$5-15. **Please be sure to have the transcript sent to ISU Transfer Evaluation, not ISU Admissions.**

Transcripts sent through the National Student Clearinghouse typically take 7-10 business days to receive after being requested. You can view your unofficial ISU transcript to check if we have received it, or you can reach out, and we can check for you.

Sending Official AP Exam Scores

You may have opted to have your scores sent to ISU when you took your AP Exam(s), in which case you will not need to send them. You can check this by clicking on the *Prior Education and Testing* link on your Student Profile via [MyISU](#), or you can reach out, and we can check for you.

If we do not have your scores, then you will need to have them officially sent. You will send your AP Exam Scores through the College Board website: <https://www.collegeboard.org/>.

Once you sign in, you will click the AP Scores button, and any exams you've taken, as well as your scores, will appear. There will be a button asking if you want to send your scores. Click on that and select Idaho State University as the college you want to have the score sent to. Please note that it will cost \$15 for each score you have to send.

If you need to send SAT/ACT scores as well, you will follow this same process.

Associate's Degree Steps - Post Intent Form Checklist

1. Schedule and Complete 1st Meeting With Your Advisor
 - a. Schedule and attend a meeting with your advisor either in-person or via Zoom.
 - b. During this meeting, you and your advisor will go over the details and steps on how to obtain your Associate's Degree.
2. Take the Focus2Career Assessments
 - a. Create an account: <https://www.isu.edu/career/focus2/>
 - i. Access Code is "bengals"
 - b. At minimum you need to take the 5 Self-Assessments
 - i. Work Interest
 - ii. Values
 - iii. Personality
 - iv. Skills
 - v. Leisure
 - c. You can take as many additional assessments as you would like.
3. Attend Career Counseling Session
 - a. After completing your Focus2Career Assessments, you must set up a career counseling appointment. (takes approximately one hour to complete.)
 - b. Call the Career Center at (208)282-2380 to schedule an appointment.
 - i. Tell them you are an ECP Associate's Degree student and that you would like to meet with a career counselor to complete a career counseling session.
 - c. At the end of your appointment, ask the career counselor to send a brief confirmation email to the Early College Program (ecp@isu.edu) so your advisor knows you have completed the session.

Note: Steps 2 and 3 of the checklist have a specific purpose. We want students to have a plan for what they would like to do after completing an Associate's Degree in order to be purposeful with the courses they are taking to fulfill the Associate's Degree. For example, most majors have specific math requirements. By having an understanding of their career goals, students can take the correct math course for their future degree path to complete the math requirement for an AA Degree.

4. Have parent/guardian attend a "Associate's Degree Parent Meeting"
 - a. Your parent/guardian will need to attend a meeting to learn about the requirements and responsibilities of having a student obtaining an Associate's Degree.
 - b. Two ways to fulfill the parent meeting
 - i. Attend the Associate's Degree Parent Meeting via Zoom in November or March
 - ii. Reach out to your advisor to schedule a parent meeting one on one
5. Have 1st Official Associate Degree Audit Meeting with Advisor
 - a. After the career center, you will need to schedule your 1st official Associate Degree Audit Meeting with your advisor for the Fall of your Junior year.
 - b. Send all unofficial transcripts to your advisor no later than 2 days before the meeting.
 - i. You will need to send an unofficial transcript from all of the colleges you have already taken dual credit courses from (other than ISU). You can take pictures/screenshots of your transcripts.
 - ii. Ask your College and Career Advisor to help you find the transcripts from your different colleges.
 - iii. Refer to **Appendix E**.

Associate's Degree - Tips for Success

1. **Be comfortable asking for help, and know who to ask for help.** We all want you to succeed!
 - a. **ISU Early College Transition Advisor** - For enrollment questions and ISU Associate Degree requirements.
 - b. **College/Career Counselor (CCA)** - For Advanced Opportunities/Fast Forward questions.
 - c. **School Counselor** - For class schedule changes and questions about high school graduation requirements. *If you make a class schedule change, be sure the adjustment does not impact your associate degree requirements. Check with your ISU advisor when adjusting your class schedule.*
 - d. **Teacher** - For questions/concerns about course content/skills.
 - e. **HINT: Use the three magic words.** This process can be quite complicated. Sometimes you might not even know what question to ask. At that point, you can use the three magic words: **"I need help."** Any contacts listed above should be able to point you in the right direction based on your situation. You can always start with your ISU advisor.
2. **Know how to access these important advising resources:**
 - a. **Contact information** for the helpful people who are listed above
 - b. **Associate degree checklists/degree plans** - to help you:
 - i. Know which courses are required for the associate degree
 - ii. Which colleges offer the dual credit courses you are taking
 - iii. Keep track of the courses you have completed and have yet to complete
 - c. **Unofficial College Transcript Instructions** - to be sure required courses are recorded
 - d. **OFFICIAL College Transcript Instructions** - for how/when to order these official documents to be sent to ISU near the end of senior year
3. **Be Organized** - Consider keeping a **college binder** with the following information:
 - a. **Account Logins**
 - i. All Colleges
 - ii. Dual Enroll - You will use the same login information for all college Dual Enroll accounts.
 - iii. Advanced Opportunities
 - b. **Student ID numbers at all colleges** - Student ID numbers will be useful when ordering all your official college transcripts to be sent to ISU senior year
 - c. **Course syllabi from all college-level courses** - These documents will be useful if you need to "petition" a transfer course at your college of attendance (after high school).
 - d. **Degree Checklists**
 - e. **Copies of Unofficial College Transcripts** – See Appendix E
4. **Get in the habit of checking your academic record (unofficial college transcripts) after each enrollment period.** Be sure the courses you signed up for are all listed on your college transcripts.
5. **Schedule annual "degree audit" meetings with your ISU advisor to be sure you are on track.**
 - a. Unofficial college transcripts from all colleges are needed at these meetings so you are certain are not missing any required courses.
 - b. These advising meetings help you know which associate degree courses you have already completed and which courses are still needed as you plan your future schedules.
6. **Please complete class registration, Fast Forward funding requests, and graduation tasks well before the deadlines.** If you wait until the day of an advertised deadline to complete a task and encounter an issue or question, you may fail to get the help you need to meet the deadline. This could result in you not receiving your associate degree. Establish the habit of completing tasks when the instructions are shared with you. The sooner the better. If you are stuck, please ask for help.

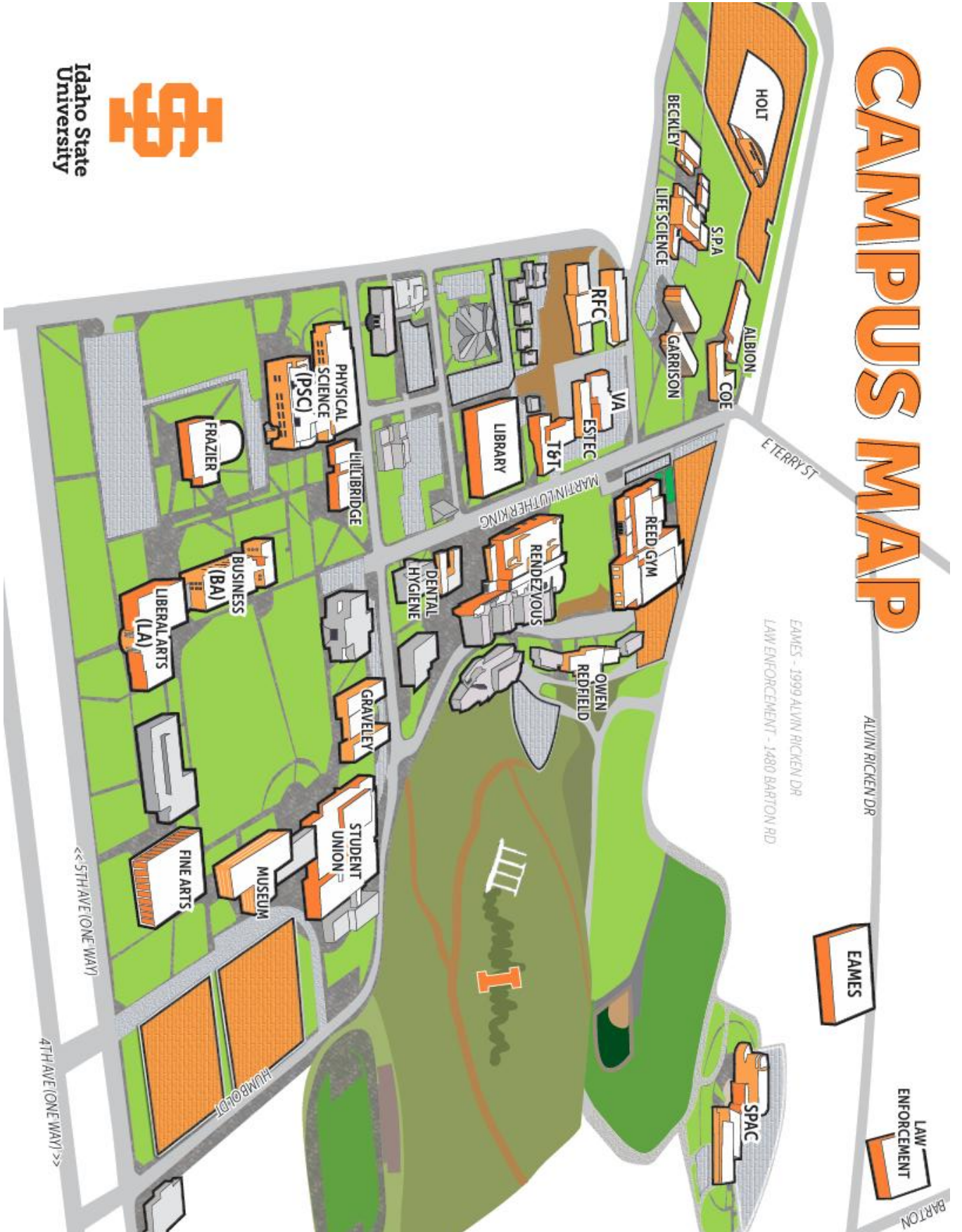

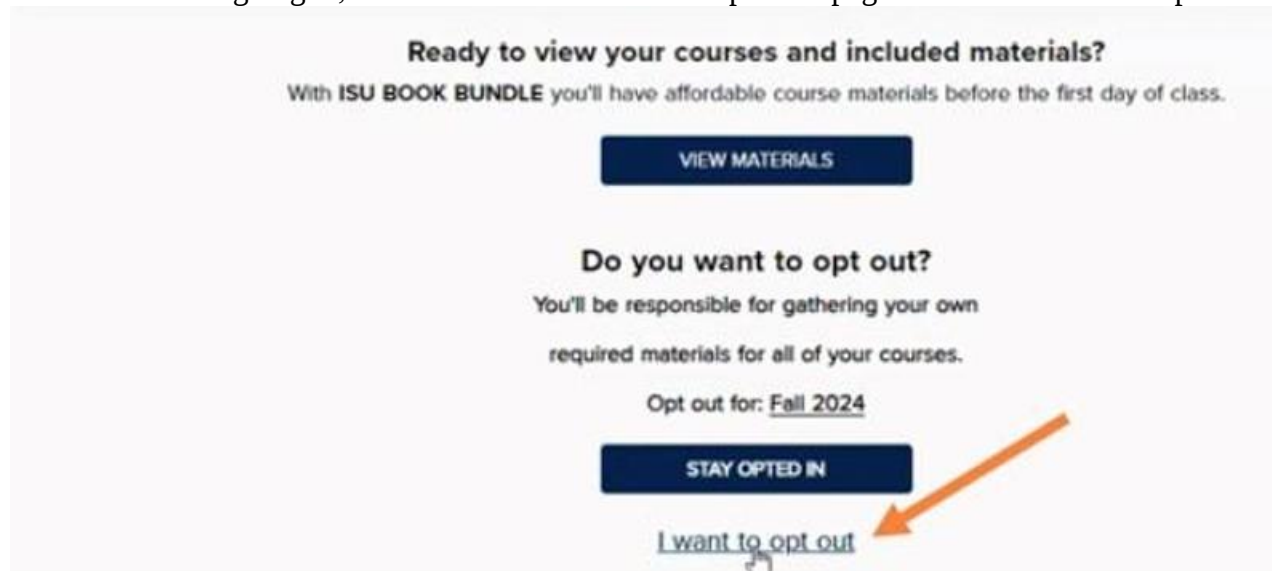
