Lizbeth Arellano Santoyo **Volunteer Medical Assistant and Spanish Interpreter at the Pocatello Free Clinic**



Lizbeth's dedication to community service began at a young age through her involvement with organizations like 4-H and Girl Scouts. Having always valued giving her time and skills back to the communities that supported her, she knew the UHP Civic Scholars Program was exactly what she was looking for. "I was attracted to its purpose of actively contributing to the community by doing service work through an organization," she notes. This passion for contribution led Lizbeth to start volunteering at the Pocatello Free Health Clinic in 2024, and she hasn't looked back since.

After initially reaching out to the organization via email, Lizbeth began her service at the American Falls site before eventually expanding to the Pocatello location. At the clinic, she serves as both a volunteer medical assistant and a Spanish interpreter, taking on tasks such as performing patient intake and running labs. She describes the environment cultivated by the welcoming clinic staff as extremely uplifting, but it is the direct patient connection that has left the biggest mark on her. "The most rewarding part is working with Hispanic patients to bridge the cultural and language gaps that often hinder their accessibility and quality of care," Lizbeth explains. "This experience resonates with me deeply coming from a Spanish-speaking background. I am grateful to support patients and build meaningful relationships with them, which have led to some patients remembering me, relating to my culture, and connecting through our shared experiences."

When she isn't volunteering or doing anything school-related, Lizbeth is highly active on campus as an Honors Envoy and an undergraduate research student. In her free time, she enjoys listening to music, doing gel x nails, baking, and going to concerts. After graduation, Lizbeth plans to move back home to Twin Falls to continue volunteering and gaining clinical experience. Ultimately, she is focused on strengthening her medical school applications as she works toward her dream of becoming a physician.

For honors students interested in meaningful and fulfilling service opportunities, Lizbeth highly recommends the Civic Scholars Program and advises students to explore different volunteering opportunities to open new doors. "My advice would be to do your research on your organization and start early," she shares. "Researching organizations will give you insight to how it aligns with your morals, values, etc. You want to make sure that you will be with an organization that fulfills and supports who you are and your purpose."

Summer Authentic Research Experiences (SARE)

Summer Authentic Research Experiences (SARE) is designed to engage Idaho undergraduates in the science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) fields related to I-CREWS research and increase the number and preparation of skilled scientists and engineers in I-CREWS fields (geosciences, biological sciences, social sciences, and resilience science, computational modeling, machine learning and artificial intelligence) to provide analytical outcomes to proactively address the impacts of meteorological, population, and technological change on energy-water (E-W) systems.

Each student receives hands-on, paid (up to \$6,000) summer research experiences (full-time or part-time educational opportunities available), where they study topics broadly related to the I-CREWS project. Each SARE educational opportunity is designed as a learning experience and not employment.

Students participating in SARE will be expected to present research results at the Idaho Conference on Undergraduate Research (ICUR) in July 2026, as well as the Idaho NSF EPSCoR Annual Meeting. Students will be expected to participate in a virtual Summer Research Community, hosted by Boise State University, and network with other students in the SARE program. Students will also be required to submit a research profile to the Idaho EPSCoR website.

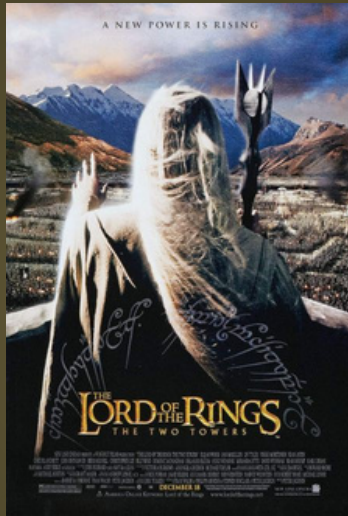
